CEO Council

Final decision, Strong Workforce Plan Endorsement, Funding Allocations, and Dispute Resolution

The CEO Council is comprised of the Chancellors, Superintendent-Presidents, and College Presidents designated by the Chancellors of the 14 community college districts in the Los Angeles and Orange County area, and the Provost/CEO of the Compton Community College District

Role

- Policy
- Advocacy
- Resource allocation, including:
 - Approval of Strong Workforce regional plan
 - Approval of annual Strong Workforce budget
- Strategic Direction, including:
 - Partnerships
 - Data Integrity
 - Fiscal Accountability

CEO Executive Committee

The CEO Executive Committee is comprised of five members of the CEO Council; members are appointed by the CEO Council.

Role

- Coordinate strategic efforts with CEO Council
- Review Strong Workforce regional plan and budget
- Receive input from College Presidents and Dean Resource Associates

College Presidents

The College Presidents group is comprised of the Presidents of the nine Los Angeles Community College District colleges and the nine Presidents at Orange County community colleges.

Role

- Communicate, advise and collaborate with the CEO Executive Committee and Dean Resource Associates

Dean Resource Associates

The Dean Resource Associates are comprised of five members of the College Resource Leadership Council (CRLC); members are appointed by the CRLC.

Role

- Represent the interests of the College Resource Leadership Council
- Communicate, advise and collaborate with the CEO Executive Committee and the College Presidents

College Resource Leadership Council

The College Resource Leadership Council is comprised of 30 members, representing the 15 districts in the LAOCRC. Members (two per district) are appointed by the Chancellors and Superintendent-Presidents of each district.

Role

- Program review, approval or endorsement
- Collaborate, advise and coordinate efforts with LAOCRC Executive Director

LAOCRC Executive Director

The LAOCRC Executive Director is appointed by the CEO Executive Committee.

Role

- Review Strong Workforce regional plans and submit all required documentation to the Chancellor's Office
- Develop annual LAOCRC workplan and budget in collaboration with College Resource Leadership Council
- Collaborate and coordinate efforts with LA and Orange County Directors
- Convene and preside over all joint regional meetings
- Provide staff support to the CEO Executive Committee and CEO Council

LA Director

The LA Director is selected by the LA County Sub-regional council and appointed by the CEO Executive Committee.

Role

- Collaborate, advise and support the LA County Sub-regional Council and LAOCRC Executive Director on the development of the Strong Workforce regional plan and budget
- Collaborate with the OC Director and support the OC County Sub-regional Council
- Facilitate county specific regional activities, including marketing, data utilization, and professional development efforts
- Create partnerships with Workforce Development Boards, educational institutions, and business and civic organizations
- Facilitate and assist colleges with leveraging the external resources required to implement strong workforce program initiatives

Orange County Director

The Orange County Director is selected by the Orange County Sub-regional Council and appointed by the CEO Executive Committee

Role

- Collaborate, advise and support the Orange County Sub-regional Council and LAOCRC Executive Director on the development of the Strong Workforce regional plan and budget
- Collaborate with the LA Director and support the LA County Sub-regional Council
- Facilitate county specific regional activities, including marketing, data utilization, and professional development efforts
- Create partnerships with Workforce Development Boards, educational institutions, and business and civic organizations
- Facilitate and assist colleges with leveraging the external resources required to implement strong workforce program initiatives

LA County Sub-regional Council

The LA County Sub-regional Council is comprised of 22 members, representing the 11 districts in the Los Angeles area.

Role

- Prepare LA County Strong Workforce regional plan and budget
- Facilitate and assist colleges with leveraging the external resources and key stakeholders in LA County required to successfully develop and implement Strong Workforce initiatives
- Collaborate with Workforce Development Boards (WDBs) in the Los Angeles region and LA Collaborative to identify priority and emerging sectors, viable regional projects, and regional professional development opportunities

Orange County Sub-regional Council

The Orange County Sub-regional Council is comprised of 8 members, representing the 4 districts in the Orange County area.

Role

- Prepare Orange County Strong Workforce regional plan and budget
- Facilitate and assist colleges with leveraging the external resources and key stakeholders in Orange County required to successfully develop and implement Strong Workforce initiatives
- Collaborate with Workforce Development Boards (WDBs) in the Orange County region and OC Collaborative to identify priority and emerging sectors, viable regional projects, and regional professional development opportunities

LA Collaborative

The LA Collaborative is comprised of the colleges, key talent in the LA area (Deputy Sector Navigators - DSNs, Technical Assistance Providers – TAPS), local educational agencies, interested campuses of the California State University and University of California, civic representatives, workforce development boards, representatives from the labor community, and economic development and industry sector leaders.

OC Collaborative

The OC Collaborative is comprised of the key talent in the Orange County region (Deputy Sector Navigators - DSNs, Technical Assistance Providers), local educational agencies, interested campuses of the California State University and University of California, civic representatives, workforce development boards, representatives from the labor community, and economic development and industry sector leaders.
